Libraries for All



Libraries across the country are united in their commitment to a more equitable society. As of this writing, 183 public libraries – including Charlotte Mecklenburg – have signed the Urban Library Council's (ULC) Statement on Race and Social Equity. The ULC is an innovation think tank of North America's leading public libraries, and the statement is a shared baseline upon which to build policies and actions to make communities more inclusive and just.

Like organizations around the country, your Library and Library Foundation can and must do more. We're tackling this complex issue together with transparency, urgency, and a shared commitment to a more equitable community.



Foundation Board Chair Jennifer Green reflects on our role. "Libraries are a resource for the entire community, one

of very few places that are open and free to all. We have a responsibility

Equity is about providing what each person needs. When your Library reopened in June, all locations offered the same limited services - checking out and returning materials. At some branches, this was what customers wanted. At others, staff turned away disappointed patrons desperate to use Library computers.



"The pandemic has exposed the disparities in our community - in education, health care, access to information,

and so much more. With the help of our donor community, the Library can help fill these gaps," emphasizes Second Vice Chair Helen Kimbrough.

HAPPENING NOW

- In partnership with Mecklenburg County, your Library will invest \$1.75 million of CARES Act funds to locally procure, refurbish, and distribute computers to households in need.
- With a grant from the COVID-19
 Response Fund, your Library has
 purchased 50 Chromebooks
 available for checkout from
 Library locations where demand
 for computer access is the greatest.
- Your Library is working with Charlotte-Mecklenburg Schools' virtual learning team to ensure the Library supports remote learning through easy-to-navigate digital resources, live virtual help and programming aligned with curriculum.

We miss seeing you in person. But we know you're there because even in a pandemic, this community shows up.

In March, most of the country closed. Almost immediately your Library Foundation and Library pivoted to online programming and virtual operations. 






The CommonSpark

The CommonSpark is a multi-year, public-private partnership to infuse \$135 million into improving lives and building a stronger community in Mecklenburg County.

The campaign addresses an integrated set of needs: a new Main Library uptown; a Support Services Center for non-public facing operations; systemwide technology, innovation and programming; an endowment for the future and annual operating support.

- New Main Library: \$100 million goal, 72% raised (includes \$50 million commitment from Mecklenburg County)
- Support Services Center: \$15 million goal, 100% raised (fully committed by County)
- Technology, Innovation, Programming and Annual Support: \$13 million goal, **37% raised**
- Endowment: \$7 million goal, 9% raised





PARTNERSHIP CHECK-IN

For over a year, the Library has been part of the Charlotte Journalism Collaborative, supported by the Knight Foundation and part of the national Solutions Journalism Network. Nine partners - La Noticia. Charlotte Observer, WCNC-TV, QCity Metro, WFAE and QNotes, along with the James L. Knight School of **Communication at Queens University** of Charlotte, Charlotte Mecklenburg Library and Free Press - began with a focus on finding solutions to the affordable housing shortage. In recent months, the group has pivoted to address the urgent needs of our city's most vulnerable communities in the midst of the pandemic. A recent article on the Knight Foundation's website cited the partnership as a bright spot in local news coverage, and identified the Library as the group's "unique power source," providing neutral ground for civic support and engagement.

Connecting Community

Charlotte Mecklenburg Library connects people with information, with others, and with opportunities to participate in the life of the community we share.

Martha Yesowitch is the Library's Community Partnerships Leader, and her role is to build relationships with other organizations to expand reach and impact. "Libraries are fundamentally about people," Yesowitch shares. "Our community trusts the Library, and by working together we can provide reliable information and opportunities to engage around issues important to the people of Mecklenburg County."

The ability to leverage the complementary audiences and expertise of the Library and partners make a collaboration most impactful. Two new partnerships exemplify this approach:

Look Back, Move Forward

In partnership with Digital Public Library of America (DPLA), Engage 2020 began as an election-year program series in celebration of the centennial of the 19th Amendment giving women the right to vote.

It's become much more – a safe space for our community to learn from one another, to put current issues into historical context, and to learn from the past to create a

better future. Ongoing programs highlight the stories of Black women in the suffrage movement and throughout the civil rights movement, and the partnership is collecting and archiving stories of how this watershed year is affecting people from all facets of our community. "Civic engagement helps to build a stronger community, and there's no better organization to provide the forum and the resources than the Library," explains Hannah Terrell, Branch Leader at Allegra Westbrooks

Regional Library and co-chair of the Engage 2020 committee.

Report for America

Local decisions have day-to-day impact, but local news is often under-reported or overshadowed.

In partnership with WFAE, Digital Public Library of America (DPLA) and Wikipedia, the Library has engaged in a national service program called Report for America. Three reporters – one embedded with the Library – will cover hyperlocal news, with a commitment to reporting *for* the community, not just *on* the community. The reporters will interact with community members in "news deserts" to learn what residents want others to know about their neighborhoods and share the stories locally and on Wikipedia, a free online encyclopedia. Reporter Dante Miller is exuberant about the possibilities. "This partnership fuels my dual passions for community work and journalism. By using the immense resources of the Library I can enhance every story with solid, trusted research and context."

The Charlotte collaboration marks the first time Report for America has funded a position at a non-journalistic entity.

We Can, We Do, We Will

Reflections from Lee Keesler, Charlotte Mecklenburg Library CEO



I was waiting at a red light one morning recently on the way to work, when I noticed a Library ad on the back of the CATS bus in front of me. "I CAN connect with my community" it proclaimed, and memories of what compelled me to respond to the Library CEO search in 2012 came flooding back.

Since 2012, I've learned just how many ways our Library connects with this community. It connects through literacy of every type, from traditional reading to digital, financial, civic, health and more. Through programs for the young, the young at heart, and everyone in between. It brings outreach services to schools, churches, parks, hospitals, jails and barber shops in every corner of the County. The Library provides places to gather in person and places to plug in with computers, Wi-Fi, and virtual programs and services. It's our community's scrapbook and record of its origins, people and story. Talented, caring staff solve problems, improve lives and build a stronger community.

The ways libraries gather, preserve and connect people with information will continue to evolve, and staff will continue to expand their expertise to include new technologies and the changing needs of a growing and increasingly diverse population. But the constant will be community – how we serve, unite, and sustain it. Charlotte Mecklenburg Library's vision is to be "the essential connector of a thriving community of readers, leaders and learners." It is and will remain the public commons for our community.

I will retire this spring to make way for the Library's next leader. I'm not a big fan of looking backward, but it is satisfying to know that over the last eight-plus years we've become more relevant, engaged, accessible, digital and sustainable (READS). The credit for transforming an organization badly wounded by the Great Recession of 2009-2011 goes to our staff, who weathered that storm and grew from it; our Board of Trustees who are so effectively engaged in our work; our Library Foundation and the support it provides (financial and other) and the wonderful way it tells the Library's story; our primary funder, Mecklenburg County; and our customers, friends and donors. Library is a team sport, and I cherish the opportunity to have been a part of ours.

That red light where I encountered the bus sits 100 yards from the Myers Park Library, formerly known as the South Branch Library. There, a future Library CEO and his brothers regularly accompanied their mother to borrow books – each time leaving more educated, inspired, entertained and empowered.

Charlotte Mecklenburg Library has survived over a century of social, cultural, economic and technological change because it has been connected, and is a connector. Like the sign on the bus says, "We CAN connect with our community." We can. We do. And we will.
